The SVU 6-MINUTE CHALLENGE is a series conceived in 2015 by Suzanna Halsey for SVU New York. Czech and Slovak artists, professionals, scholars, students and scientists are challenged to present their talent, the subject of their work, project, research or studies in a short presentation limited to six minutes.

Eben sailed to NYC from Maine and presently lives on board his 30’ sailboat at a marina next door to Ellis Island, where his mother’s Slovak grandparents arrived in 1924 from the Carpathian Mts.
